## Code Enforcement Division

### 300 Block of North Crawford Avenue

The City continues to make progress in addressing unsafe and unsanitary properties within the community. Following ongoing complaints and previous enforcement actions, an abatement warrant was successfully executed for a property located in the 300 block of North Crawford Avenue, and the house has now been abated. These efforts addressed hazardous conditions and eliminated threats to public health and safety. With the immediate dangers resolved, the City is now working with the appropriate parties to bring the property into full compliance with the municipal code. The next phase will focus on ensuring the site is maintained in a safe and orderly condition moving forward.

### 200 Block of North Merrill Avenue

After concerns about an unsafe structure in the 200 block of North Merrill Avenue were brought to the City's attention, particularly due to its proximity to the high school and growing concerns for student safety, the Code Enforcement Division acted swiftly to address the issue. With the assistance of the Public Works Department, the residence was secured to prevent unsafe entry and to eliminate potential hazards.

These coordinated efforts ensured that the property was made safe for the surrounding neighborhood and helped protect the well-being of students and residents alike. The City remains committed to proactively addressing code enforcement issues that impact public safety and neighborhood cleanliness.

## Willows Municipal Code Fun Fact:

With weed abatement season underway, did you know that weeds aren't just an eyesore but can be declared a public nuisance? Under Willows Municipal Code § 8.05.020 it is unlawful for trash, weeds, and household items like appliances to be kept in the yard.



### Title 8

### HEALTH AND SAFETY

### Chapter 8.05 Garbage, Rubbish, and Weeds

#### [8.05.020 Unlawful accumulations – Regulations for accumulations.](#)

(1) Compliance with Sections. It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit, keep, accumulate or permit, cause or suffer any garbage or rubbish to be accumulated upon any lot or parcel of land, or on any public or private place, street, lane, alley, or drive, unless the same shall be kept, deposited, or allowed to accumulate as provided by this section; provided, with a building permit so to do, it shall not be unlawful for any person to deposit, or cause to be deposited, any brick, brickbats, cement, plaster, stones and gravel in any place authorized in said permit.

(2) Receptacles. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep, accumulate or permit to be accumulated any garbage for a period in excess of seven days, upon any lot or parcel of land or on any public or private land, place, street, alley or drive, unless the same shall be maintained in a container of a size, type and construction hereinafter set forth or approved in writing by the director of public works of the city of Willows. Unless otherwise authorized, such receptacles shall have a capacity of not less than 15 gallons nor more than 30 gallons and the receptacle shall be constructed of galvanized metal or substantial plastic provided with handles and close fitting metal or substantial plastic lids or covers. Said lids or covers shall be kept closed at all times except when necessarily opened to permit garbage to be taken therefrom or deposited therein.

(3) Rubbish. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep, accumulate or permit to be kept or accumulated any rubbish, for a period in excess of 30 days, unless the same be kept in receptacles of the size, type and construction hereinabove set forth for the containment of garbage or as otherwise approved, in writing, by the director of public works of the city of Willows.

(4) Deposits in Streets, etc. It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit, except as herein provided, any garbage or rubbish in or upon any public or private lane, place, street, alley or drive or any gutters or any drain facilities connected therewith. [Ord. 551-79, 6-26-79. Prior code § 8-2].

# Engineering Division

## Sycamore Park and Pool Project Update

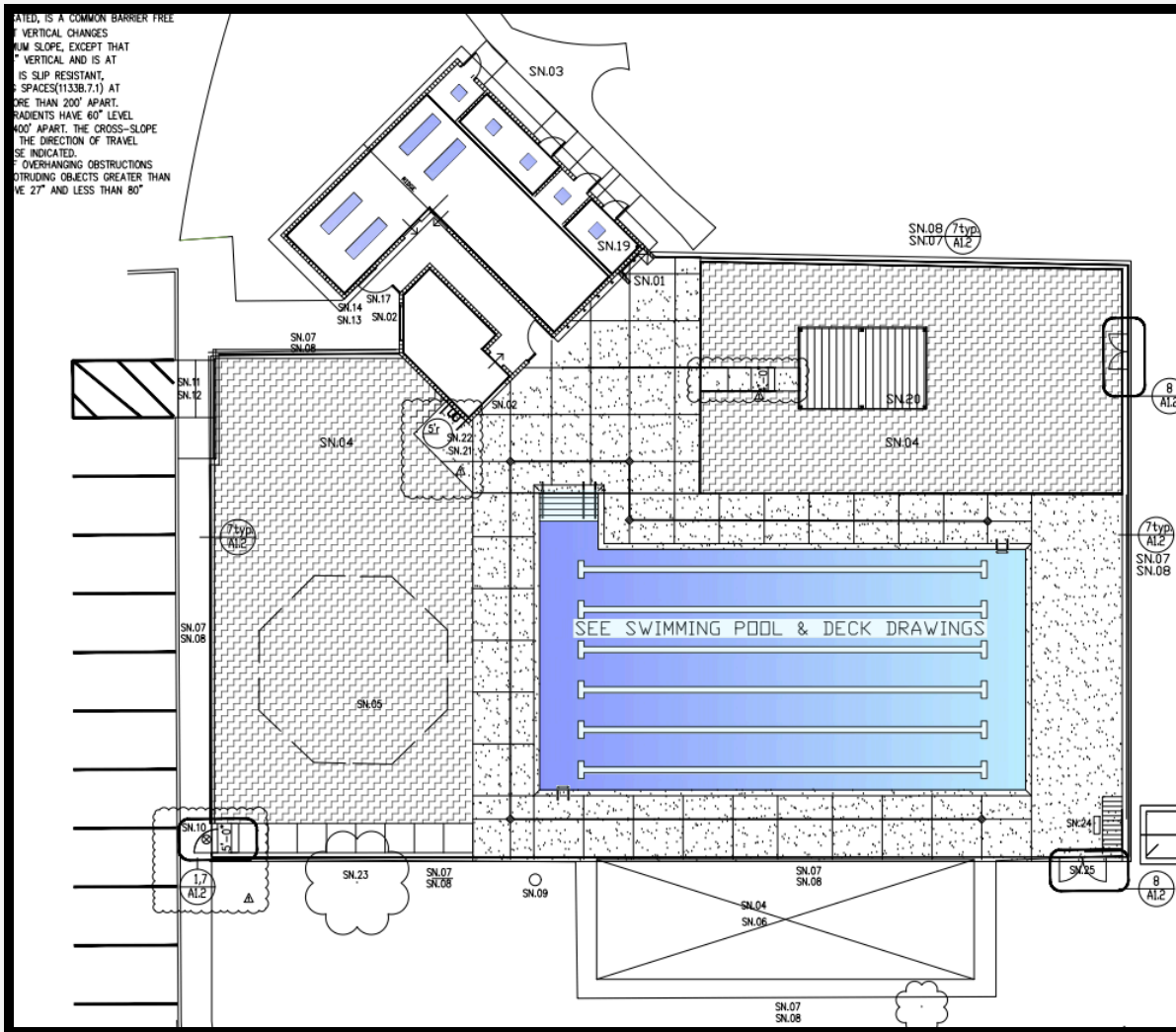
The City of Willows has approved a revised plan for the City's Sycamore Park and Pool Project after construction bids came in over budget, creating a significant shortfall of approximately \$1.8 million. To keep the project moving forward, the City is repackaging and rebidding the project to complete it based on available funding while still providing meaningful improvements to the community.

The revised plan prioritizes improvements that provide the greatest immediate public benefit, including rehabilitation of the community pool, improvements to the existing tennis courts, conversion of two courts for pickleball use, and other sidewalk and small amenity improvements.

Under the revised approach, the City will defer replacement of the walking path, along with walking pathway lighting and related solar improvements. Those deferred components may still be completed later if additional funding becomes available, while pickleball and tennis court lighting will remain part of the project.

Although delays in engineering have slowed the project, plan revisions are expected to move quickly. The City anticipates advertising and bidding the project in May, with construction expected to begin in the summer of 2026.

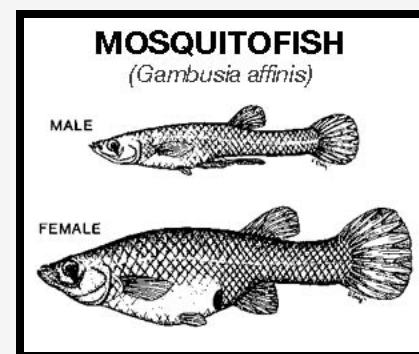
The City remains committed to completing the City's Sycamore Park and Pool Project and appreciates the public's patience as staff work through funding challenges and project timeline adjustments. These changes are intended to move the project forward in a practical and responsible way while still delivering meaningful community improvements.

### Current Condition of the City Pool

While the community has voiced concerns about the appearance and condition of the city's swimming pool water, it's critical that the swimming pool remain filled with water during this period to help protect the structure. When a pool is drained, groundwater pressure beneath and around the pool can create upward force on the shell, which can lead to cracking, shifting, or even lifting of the pool structure. Keeping water in the pool helps counterbalance that pressure and reduces the risk of costly structural damage while the project moves forward.



The water may appear stagnant, but the City has placed mosquito fish in the pool as a proactive control measure. Mosquitoes lay eggs in standing water, and their immature stages develop there, which is why unmanaged standing water can become a public health concern. Mosquito fish feed on mosquito larvae and are widely used in California as a biological mosquito-control method.

## Special Joint City Council & Planning Commission Meeting

The City of Willows invites community members to attend a Joint Planning Commission and City Council meeting on **April 30, 2026, at 5:30 p.m.** This important meeting will focus on the review and rewriting of Title 18 of the Willows Municipal Code, which governs zoning within the City.

Title 18 establishes the framework for land use and development in Willows. It outlines the various zoning districts, identifies what types of uses are permitted within each zone, and sets standards for development. The chapter also addresses processes such as use permits, site development standards, and other regulations that guide how the community grows and evolves. This meeting will provide a valuable opportunity for residents, business owners, and stakeholders to share their input and help shape the future of Willows. Harris & Associates, the City's contract planning firm, will present and facilitate the discussion to gather community feedback on potential updates to the zoning code. Public participation is strongly encouraged, as community input is essential to ensuring that the updated code reflects the community's vision for future growth and development.

## Planning Commission Action Roundup

### April 7 Planning Commission Meeting

#### TESLA 96 Stall Charging Station Project

Approved a design review application submitted by Tesla, Inc. for a major electric vehicle charging station to be located on an empty lot at 475 North Humboldt Avenue. The approved project will feature a total of 96 Tesla V4 Supercharger stalls, making it one of the largest charging hubs in the region. In addition to the charging infrastructure, the development will

include an amenities building to enhance the experience for travelers and local users alike. To allow for efficient construction and scalability, the project will be completed in two phases:

- Phase 1: Installation of 56 Supercharger stalls.
- Phase 2: Installation of the remaining 40 Supercharger stalls along with the amenities building.

The project will potentially serve both local electric vehicle drivers and a substantial volume of Interstate 5 travelers. By attracting visitors off the freeway, the project presents an exciting opportunity to increase visibility for Willows, encourage travelers to explore local businesses, and stimulate economic activity within the community. The City is enthusiastic about the positive impact this development will have, not only by expanding access to electric vehicle charging infrastructure but also by supporting sustainable transportation and economic growth.

## **Municipal Code Review**

The Planning Commission completed a detailed review of the proposed updates to Titles 1 through 4 of the Willows Municipal Code, which address general provisions and enforcement, City administration and personnel, revenue and finance, and the reserved Title 4. The Commission worked through the draft page by page and provided a number of meaningful edits, comments, and recommendations that will be incorporated into the next round of revisions.

## **Project Update**

### **Jack in the Box**

The proposed Jack in the Box at 1240 West Wood Street was originally approved by the Planning Commission in July 2021 as a new 2,739-square-foot restaurant with a double drive-through, parking, landscaping, signage, and related site improvements. Over the next several years, the City continued to work with the applicant to keep the project active and moving through the approval process. When another extension was no longer available under

the prior entitlement, the applicant resubmitted the project, and the Planning Commission renewed the Use Permit and Design Review on October 16, 2024.

Throughout that time, the project continued to move through building, civil, and sign plan check review. The project required an unusually high number of review cycles and resubmittals before the plans could be approved. These were not optional revisions requested by the City, but corrections required to bring the submitted plans into compliance with applicable building codes, civil engineering standards, accessibility requirements, and sign regulations.

As with any commercial development, the City could not approve plans that did not satisfy the required codes and technical standards. The City's responsibility was to review the submitted plans, identify deficiencies, and require that the plans be corrected so they complied with all applicable regulations before permits could be issued. Progress was slowed because the architect and engineer were not able to adequately resolve plan check comments in a complete and timely manner, which resulted in repeated rounds of review and delayed final plan approval.

By fall 2024, the project had obtained its necessary City approvals and had advanced through the City's review authority. At that point, the remaining external issue was the Caltrans Encroachment Permit for work within the State right-of-way along West Wood Street. While the applicant team was working through the first round of Caltrans plan check comments, communication with the City stopped and the project has not advanced since. The record reflects that City staff continued processing the project and moved it as far as it could, but the project ultimately stalled during the external agency permitting process. To the best of city staff's knowledge, this project is not going to move forward.

## **Public Works Division**

### **Sewer Backups: Multiple Locations**

City staff have been addressing a number of private sewer lateral issues occurring at various locations throughout the City. Although private sewer laterals are the responsibility of individual property owners, Public Works and Code Enforcement worked with affected residents and property owners to help move corrective actions forward. Staff contacted the impacted parties, provided guidance on the steps needed to address the issues, and coordinated with property owners to ensure that licensed plumbers were engaged where necessary to clear blockages and restore service.



These cooperative efforts helped reduce impacts to surrounding areas and support timely resolution. The City appreciates the responsiveness of the property owners involved and remains committed to providing guidance and coordination when infrastructure-related concerns arise.



## Purple Heart Community Signs Installed

The City of Willows is pleased to share that Purple Heart Community signs have been installed on Highway 99 West, just outside the city limits to the North and South. The signs serve as a visible tribute to the brave men and women who were wounded or lost their lives in combat while serving in the United States Armed Forces.

The Willows City Council formally adopted the Purple Heart City designation on July 23, 2024, reflecting the City's ongoing commitment to honoring and supporting the County's veterans. This effort was led by Carol Lemenager of VFW Auxiliary Post 1770, with support from the City of Willows, and Glenn County Public Works who completed the installation. The newly installed signs are a symbol of gratitude and recognition of the sacrifices made by the nation's veterans in defense of our country's freedoms.

Additional signs are planned for installation along Highway 162 in the coming months. The City extends its appreciation to Carol Lemenager and VFW Auxiliary Post 1770 for their leadership, and to Glenn County Public Works for their assistance in bringing this project to completion.

## Waste Management Community Cleanup Event Scheduled!

The City of Willows is excited to host another free Community Cleanup Day on **June 6, 2026, from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. at 1600 South Tehama Street**. This event is provided at no cost to residents as part of the City's Waste Management contract and is a great opportunity for community members to clean up around their homes and help keep Willows looking its best.

Accepted materials include household garbage, metal furniture, mattresses, e-waste, and appliances. Residents must bring a valid I.D. or proof of residency. Please note, this is a self-disposal event, meaning participants will be responsible for unloading their own materials.

We appreciate everyone who takes part in helping keep Willows clean, safe, and welcoming. Events like this are a great example of community pride in action, and we hope to see a strong turnout.

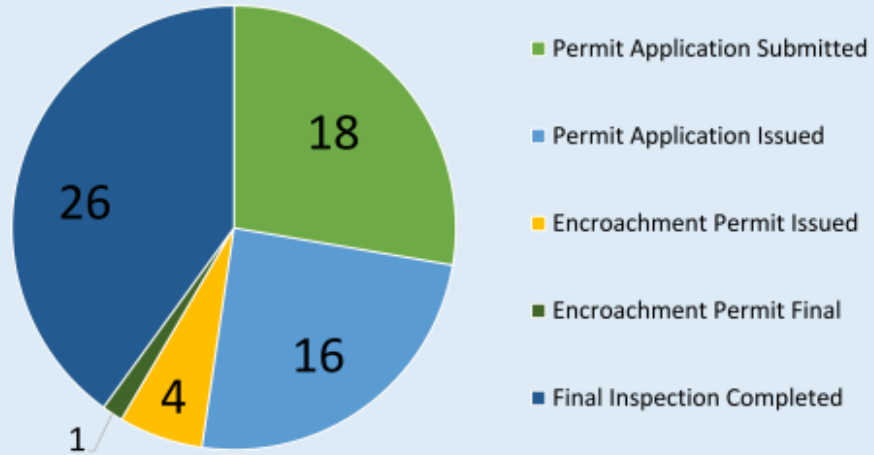
### Strong Turnout for Willows Spring Soccer Program

### Community Development Activity March 2026

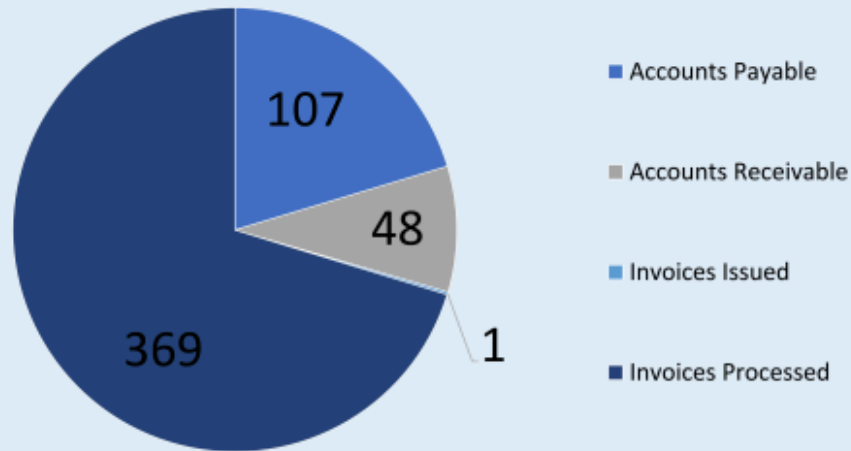

#### Hazardous Fuels Reduction Program Began April 13

The Willows Fire Department (WFD) began its 2026 Hazardous Fuels Reduction Program on April 13, an annual effort to reduce wildfire risk by removing hazardous vegetation throughout the City.

This long-standing program—now in place for more than 40 years—plays a critical role in protecting lives, property, and helping maintain lower homeowner insurance costs. WFD will conduct surveys of overgrown vegetation during the weeks of **April 13, May 11, and May 26**, with notices issued to property owners where fire hazards are identified and exist.

All identified hazards must be abated by **May 31, 2026**. Properties not brought into compliance may be abated by the City at the owner's expense. Residents are encouraged to maintain their properties by clearing dry vegetation and creating defensible space, particularly as wildfire season approaches.

#### *Wall That Heals Escort*

On March 24, the Willows Fire Department (WFD) escorted the *Wall That Heals*, a traveling replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. The exhibit honors the service and sacrifice of the more than 58,000 U.S. service members who lost their lives during the Vietnam War and provides an opportunity for communities to reflect, remember, and pay tribute.

WFD personnel raised the American flag over Wood Street as the convoy traveled through Willows on its way to the Orland High School football stadium, where the exhibit was displayed. The escort served as a solemn and respectful welcome, recognizing the significance of the memorial and those it represents.



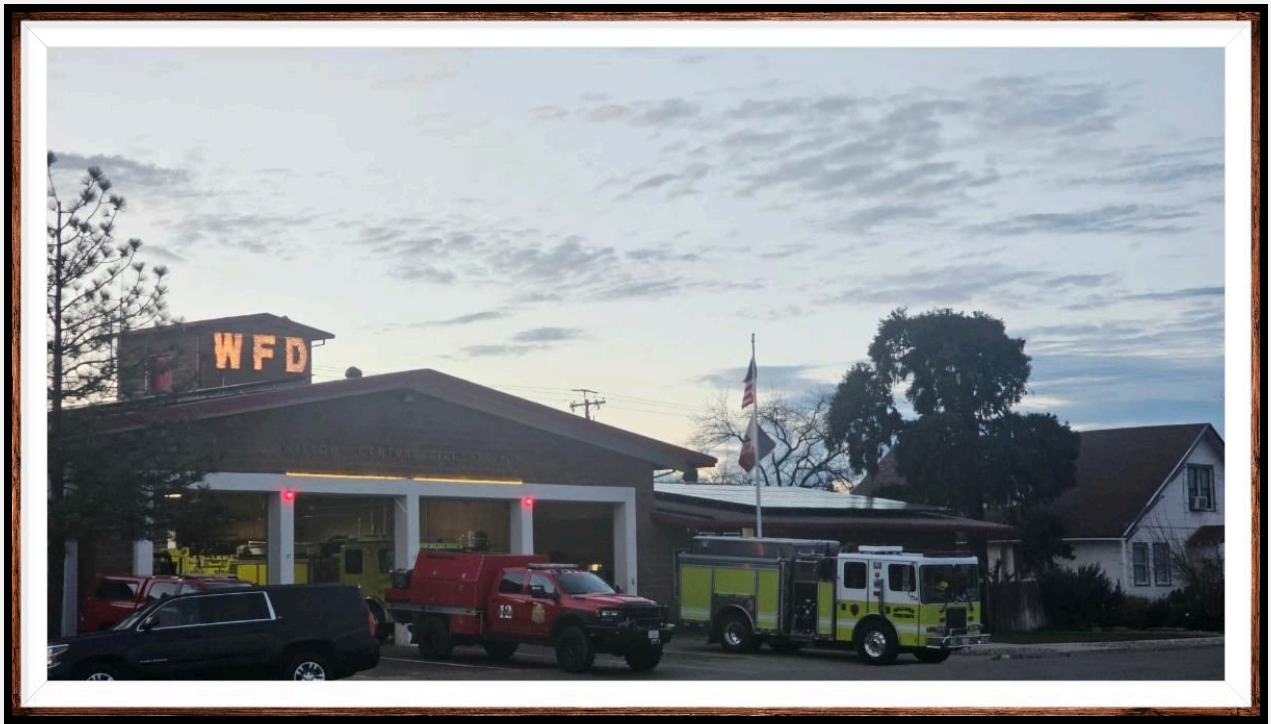
Raising the flag over Wood Street for the *Wall that Heals*.

## WFD Events

### Annual Bean Feed

On **March 1**, the Willows Fire Department (WFD) hosted its annual **Bean Feed**, which was well attended by the community. ## **Prevention**

### **Controlled Burns**

The Willows Fire Department (WFD) conducted two controlled burns in March to reduce hazardous fuel loads and improve fire safety within the community. One burn took place along the GCID canal near Interstate 5, and the second was conducted at the City Yard sewer pond.

These controlled burns are an important proactive measure used to remove dry vegetation and other combustible materials that can contribute to the rapid spread of wildfires. By reducing fuel loads in targeted areas, WFD helps decrease fire intensity, improve defensible space, and protect critical infrastructure and surrounding properties.

All burns were carefully planned and conducted under appropriate weather and safety conditions, with personnel monitoring fire behavior to ensure operations remained controlled and effective. These efforts support the City's ongoing commitment to fire prevention, public safety, and risk reduction.

### **Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) Systems**

The Willows Fire Department has completed maintenance and recertification of its SCBA cascade compressor system. This crucial equipment is responsible for filling the SCBAs used by firefighters during hazardous and low-oxygen incidents. Regular servicing and certification ensure the system operates safely, efficiently, and in compliance with industry standards. This work helps us maintain the highest level of respiratory protection for our firefighters as they serve the community.



## Annual Pump Testing

The Willows Fire Department has successfully completed its annual mandated pump testing on all frontline fire apparatus. These tests ensure that each engine's pump operates at peak performance and meets national safety and reliability standards set by the National Fire Protection Association. Completing this yearly certification helps guarantee that the Fire Department's equipment is ready to respond effectively to any emergency and continues to provide the highest level of service to the community.

## Annual Hose Testing

The Willows Fire Department began its annual fire hose testing in accordance with National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards. The process involves inspecting, pressure-testing, and documenting the condition of every fire hose to ensure it performs safely and reliably during emergency operations. Regular hose testing is an essential part of the department's readiness efforts, helping to maintain dependable equipment and continue providing strong, effective service to the community.

**Fun Fact: the Fire Department has over 10,000 Feet of Fire Hose!**

## Training

### Structural Firefighting Training & Operations

WVFD held three training nights in March focused on structural firefighting operations. Firefighters conducted ventilation and search training, with an emphasis on Vent, Enter, Isolate, Search (VEIS) techniques. VEIS allows firefighters to quickly access and search specific rooms from the exterior when time is critical. By isolating the space and controlling fire conditions, this method helps crews locate and remove victims more efficiently and safely. Ongoing training in VEIS ensures firefighters remain prepared to perform rapid, effective rescues when seconds matter.

## **Other Trainings**

Members also trained on radio communications, scene size-up, incident command, and the use of self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA).

The program was well attended and provided a hands-on, engaging experience for young participants, fostering creativity and community connection at the library.

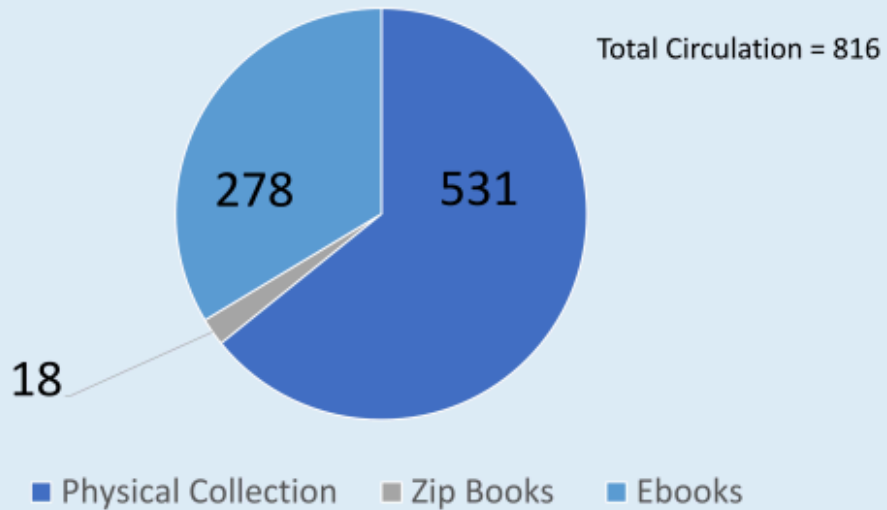
