Willows City Manager Announces Resignation

WILLOWS, CA (September 17, 2026) — City Manager Marti Brown has announced her resignation from the City of Willows. Her last day of employment with the City will be Friday, October 16, 2026.

Brown has served as City Manager since August 2021, overseeing the City's day-to-day operations and a broad range of municipal services, programs, projects, and initiatives. During her tenure, Brown has led the City through a number of significant financial, organizational, and operational challenges while working to strengthen the City's long-term financial position, advance infrastructure and capital improvement priorities, and modernize administrative systems and processes.

"I have appreciated the opportunity to serve as City Manager and to work with the City Council and City employees during my tenure," Brown said. "I am proud of what we have accomplished together and believe the organization is well positioned to continue building on that progress."

Among the major initiatives undertaken during her tenure were the successful passage of a 1.5% local sales tax measure; development of long-term financial forecasting and capital improvement planning; refinancing of the City's wastewater debt; initiation and

implementation of major capital improvement projects; implementation of new administrative and financial technology; and oversight of comprehensive updates to the City's General Plan, Housing Element, and Municipal Code.

Over the next several weeks, Brown will work with City staff and the City Council to facilitate an orderly transition of responsibilities and ensure continuity of ongoing projects and initiatives.

The City Council is considering the process to address the City Manager position following Brown's departure. Additional information regarding the transition will be provided as it becomes available.

Willows Water Fest Event: Celebrating 100 years of Cal Water Service and 140 Years of Incorporation of the City of Willows!

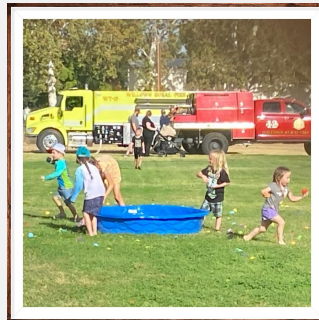
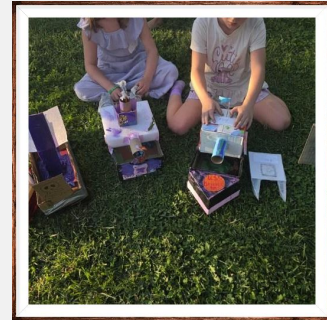
The first-ever Willows Water Fest brought the community together for a fun and engaging evening at Central Park on September 10.

City Council Action Roundup

August 18, August 25, and September 8 City Council Meetings

August 18

- Conducted candidate forum-style interviews and adopted Resolution 37-2026 appointing John Lowe to fill the vacancy on the Willows City Council.

August 25

- Adopted Resolution 38-2026 authorizing the City Manager to execute an agreement with Franklin Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$409,409, with a 10% construction contingency of \$40,941, for construction management and inspection services, for the FY 2025-2026 street pavement and construction projects on Oak Street from Marshall to Murdock Streets and Madrone Manor.
- Authorized the City Manager to execute a Professional Services Agreement with Capital Rivers, Inc., dba Capital Rivers Connect, in an amount not to exceed \$60,000, funded by the 2021 USDA Rural Business Development Grant, for the Rural Economic Development Strategy and Business Attraction Project, and authorize the expenditure of the remaining grant funds.
- Authorized the City Manager, or her designee, to execute and administer on-call general building and civil plan check service agreements with Paxton Inspection Services, Development Compliance Solutions (DEVCOM), BPR Consulting, BUREAU VERITAS, and Interwest.
- Adopted Resolution 39-2026 re-establishing the Willows Police Department, authorizing participation in the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) program, and authorizing preparations for law enforcement services.
- Introduced, by title only, an Ordinance acknowledging the re-establishment of the Willows Police Department and amending Chapter 2.65 of the Willows Municipal Code, and waived the full reading of the text.
- Authorized the City Manager to execute a contract with Lexipol, LLC (via the City's risk management JPA, NCCSIF) for a web-based police department policy and procedure management platform and associated consulting and implementation services, in an amount not to exceed \$10,000.00 annually.
- Adopted Resolution 40-2026 opposing Assembly Bill 1383 (AB 1383).
- Approved the Police Chief job classification and salary schedule, with amendments.
- Approved the Police Chief Recruitment and Appointment process.
- Approved the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for Tenant Improvements to the Civic Center.

September 8

- Approved the City of Willows Social Media Policy establishing standards for the use and management of official City social media accounts and employee use of social media in connection with City business.

- Approved the City of Willows Artificial Intelligence (AI) Use Policy to establish guidelines for the responsible and appropriate use of artificial intelligence tools by City employees.
- Approved the City of Willows Privacy Policy establishing guidelines regarding the collection, use, disclosure, retention, and protection of personal information obtained through City services, websites, official communications, and social media platforms.
- Adopted Resolution 41-2026 approving continued participation in the Federal Excess Personal Property (FEPP) Program; approve Cooperative Agreement No. 992509 between the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) and the Willows Fire Department; and authorized Fire Chief Nathan Monck to execute the agreement and related program documents on behalf of the City.
- Approved the Police Officer job classification and salary schedule as part of the re-establishment of the Willows Police Department.
- Approved the Police Administrative Services Technician classification and salary schedule as part of the re-establishment of the Willows Police Department.
- Adopted Ordinance 770-2026 acknowledging the re-establishment of the Willows Police Department and amending Chapter 2.65 of the Willows Municipal Code, by title only and waive the full reading of the text.
- Appointed Susan Domenighini, Laurel Hill-Ward, and Joyce Welch-Ksander to the Library Board of Trustees for terms ending June 30, 2029s.
- Adopted Resolution 42-2026 authorizing the City Manager to execute an agreement with REM Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$3,468,154.30 (base bid plus Alternates 1 and 2), with a 15% construction contingency of \$520,223.00, and to execute an agreement for construction management and inspection services, provided the total project cost does not exceed the total project funding of \$4,715,000.00 for the Willows Mobility, Recreation and Beautification Project at Sycamore Park and Community Pool Complex.

Code Enforcement Division

Willows Municipal Code Fun Fact:

Did you know that under WMC § 8.10.020, storing junk, trash, debris, discarded furniture, building materials, inoperative vehicle parts, or similar refuse in a manner that is unsightly or detrimental to public health, safety, or the general welfare can be declared a public nuisance?

The Code also specifically prohibits dumping garbage, refuse, junk, or waste material on someone else's property.

§ 8.10.020

Public Nuisance Designated

It is declared a public nuisance for any person owning, leasing, occupying or having charge or possession of any premises in the city to maintain upon such premises, or to permit, cause, or allow to exist on such premises, any condition which is detrimental to the public health, safety, or general welfare or which constitutes a public nuisance as defined by WMC § 8.10.010. Such conditions shall include but shall not be limited to the following:

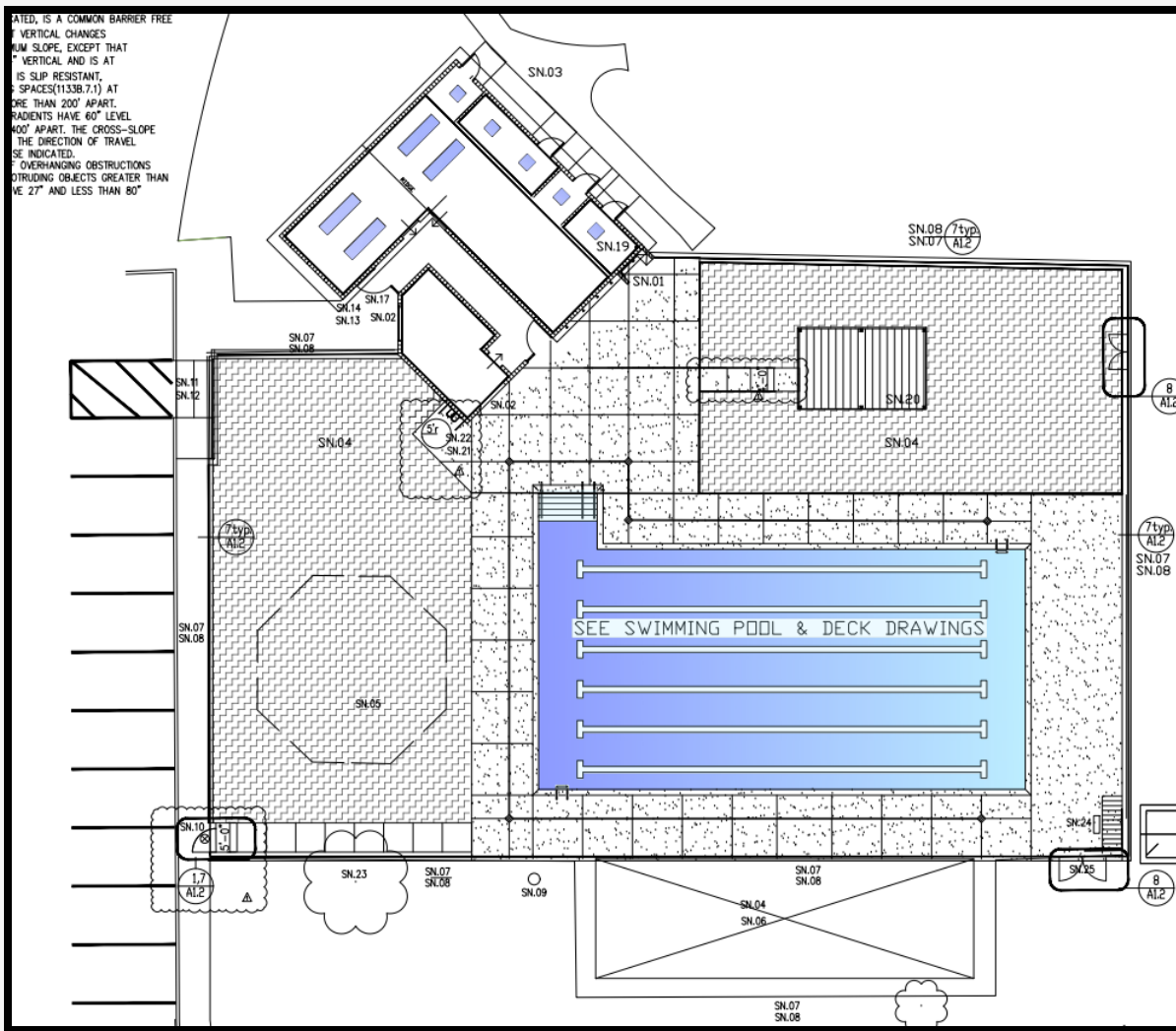
- (5) To store any materials, equipment, vehicles (including trailers, campers, and boats), broken or discarded furniture or equipment (including refrigerators, freezers, and stoves), boxes, lumber, junk, trash, or debris in any yard area in such a manner or in such condition as to be detrimental to the public health, safety, or general welfare.

Engineering Division

Sycamore Park and Pool Improvement Project: Construction Contract Awarded

On September 8, 2026, the City Council awarded the construction contract for the Sycamore Park Project to REM Construction, Inc., authorizing this long-planned and delayed project to move into the construction phase. The project will bring major improvements to the Community Pool, along with upgrades to the park's recreational facilities, including conversion of a tennis court for pickleball use, improvements to the remaining tennis facilities, and new court lighting to expand opportunities for evening play.

The City is currently working with REM Construction to complete bonding, insurance, submittals, and other required pre-construction items. Construction is anticipated to begin early to mid-October. The City is excited to see construction move forward and looks forward to delivering an improved Community Pool and expanded tennis and pickleball opportunities for Willows.



Recreation Center & Park Grant: Community Input

The City of Willows is continuing to explore opportunities for a new community recreation project and seeking residents help and input to shape this future potential project's development and outcome.

The City is considering a range of options, including a new park and/or a community recreation center. A recreation center could provide space for activities such as basketball, volleyball, pickleball, futsal, youth programs, community events, and other indoor recreation opportunities. A park could include amenities such as playgrounds, sports courts, open lawn areas, picnic and gathering spaces, shade, walking areas, and other outdoor recreational features.

Public input will help guide the discussion regarding potential locations, whether the community prefers a park or recreation center, and which amenities should be prioritized. The City is evaluating these ideas as part of a potential Statewide Park Program Round 5 grant application and will continue holding public meetings as concepts are developed. The City Council will also provide direction before any final application is submitted.

The next community input meeting will be held on Monday, October 5, 2026, from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. in City Council Chambers, 201 North Lassen Street. Residents are encouraged to attend, share ideas, and help shape the future of recreation in Willows.

Planning Commission Meeting, September 1, 2026

Northern Valley Indian Health (NVIH): Design Review and Conditional Use Permit (Approved)

The Planning Commission approved the Design Review and Conditional Use Permit for NVIH's proposed new facility at 243 West Walnut Street.

The approximately 20,251-square-foot building will provide behavioral health, community health, and outreach services. The approved project includes 29 on-site parking spaces, supplemented by nearby leased and existing NVIH parking to meet the project's parking needs.

The approval allows the project to move forward into the next stages of permitting and development.

Upcoming Projects

I-5 Cannabis Dispensary Signage

The City has received a planning permit application for new exterior and window signage for the proposed I-5 Cannabis Dispensary at 130 North Butte Street, Suite AB. The application identifies the project as exterior signage and a window logo for business identification. The project is scheduled to be considered at the **October 6, 2026** Planning Commission Meeting.



The applicant has submitted conceptual renderings showing a rectangular exterior business sign and a shield-style window graphic. Staff is currently reviewing the proposed signage for consistency with the City's applicable sign and design standards before the application moves forward to the review process.

Willows Travel Plaza: Road 57 Chevron

Building plans have recently been submitted for the Willows Travel Plaza expansion at 1481 South Tehama Street and are now undergoing the City's plan check review process.

The project includes a major expansion of the site's commercial fueling operations, including nine new diesel fueling lanes for commercial trucks, dedicated RV fueling, electric truck charging stations, and areas reserved for future hydrogen and compressed natural gas fueling. The project also includes a truck service center, wash facilities, truck scale, and expansion of the existing convenience store.

Staff will continue working with the project team through plan check as the project moves toward building permit issuance and construction.

Public Works Division

Wayfinding Signs

The first four of the City's new wayfinding signs have now been installed, including two at Wood and Lassen Streets and two at Sycamore and Tehama Streets.

Additional signs will be installed at Wood and Butte Streets and at Sycamore and Lassen Streets. The signs are designed to help residents and visitors more easily find shopping and dining, the Civic Center and Library, Museum, parks, Veterans Hall, and other community destinations.

Thank you to everyone involved in developing, designing, and installing the new signs. This project is helping improve navigation throughout Willows while creating a more welcoming and consistent navigation signage in the community.



Softball Field Lighting Upgrades Completed

Electrical and timer upgrades have now been completed at both the east and west softball fields. With the field work finished, Musco will complete programming of the lighting control system and provide the City with remote access to manage lighting schedules. This will allow staff to more efficiently program lights for practices, games, tournaments, and other scheduled activities while reducing unnecessary operating time.

The upgrades improve the reliability and functionality of the field lighting systems and give the City greater control over how and when the facilities are illuminated.

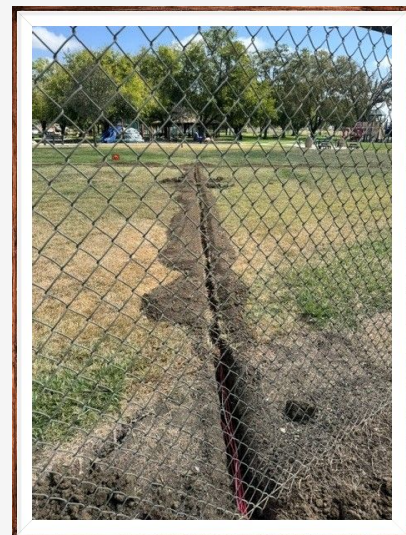

Jensen Park Public Works Irrigation Repairs Underway

Public Works crews are currently repairing and rewiring several affected irrigation systems at Jensen Park where previous electrical wiring had failed and caused watering controls to malfunction.

Crews are replacing wiring between irrigation valves and control systems to restore reliable operation and improve watering schedules. The work is being completed at multiple locations and will help ensure landscaped areas



receive proper watering while reducing unnecessary water use caused by malfunctioning controls.

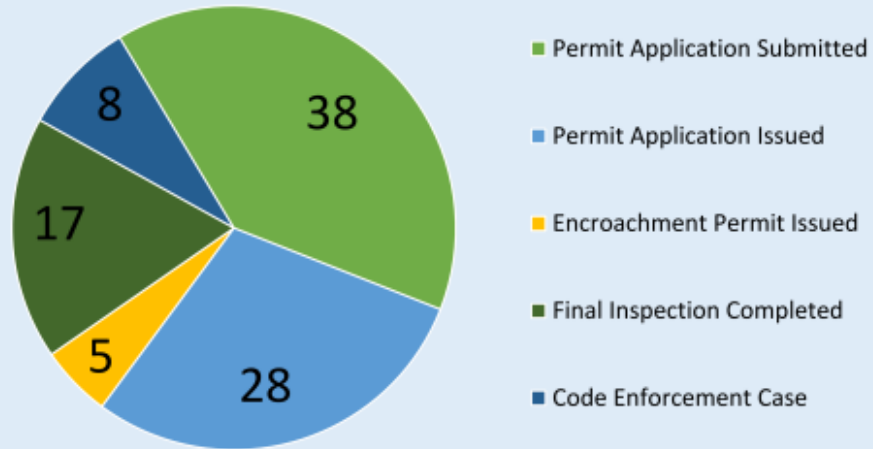

Finance is committed to a thorough and transparent audit process and continues to work diligently to improve our financial reporting and internal controls.



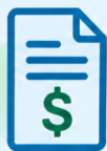

Our adopted debt policy meets the State's requirements, and we certify compliance with each issuance. We continue to review our policy to ensure it reflects current best practices.



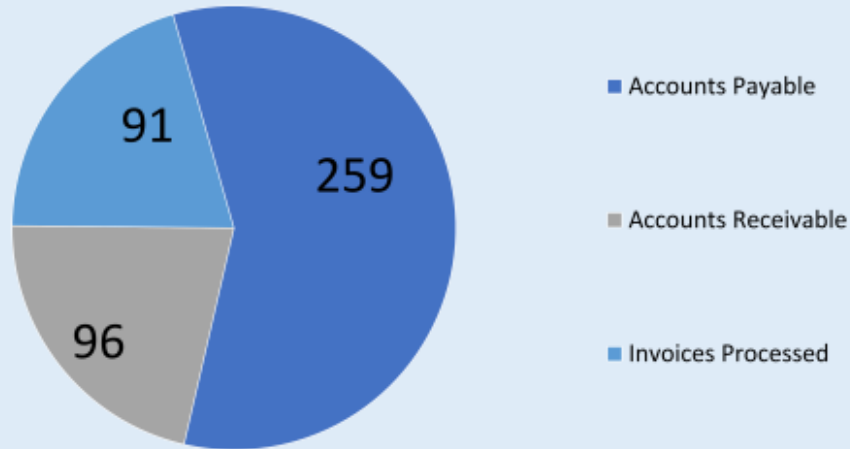
Areas for Continued Improvement:

Fire Response, Prevention & Emergency Medical Services

Major Incidents & Emergency Response

Mutual Aid Response: Orland Structure and Vegetation Fire

On August 13, the Willows Fire Department responded to assist with a structure fire in Orland that had spread into nearby vegetation. WFD provided mutual aid with two fire engines and one water tender, helping support suppression efforts and prevent further spread. Mutual aid responses such as this highlight the importance of cooperation among local fire agencies, particularly during the peak of wildfire season.

Prevention

Abandoned Vehicle Abatement

The Willows Fire Department (WFD) continues to assist with efforts to address abandoned and inoperative vehicles within the City limits. During the month of August, WFD tagged six vehicles for removal and completed its first abandoned vehicle abatement tow. The vehicle, a partially dismantled sedan located in the 1300 block of West Wood Street, was removed as part of the City's ongoing efforts to address nuisance conditions and improve neighborhood safety and appearance.

Training and Wildfire Preparedness

WFD continued its hands-on training and wildfire preparedness activities throughout August. On August 4, firefighters conducted a controlled burn at the City Corporation Yard, providing personnel with an opportunity to practice fire behavior observation and suppression techniques in a controlled environment.

On August 11, WFD conducted additional wildland fire training focused on radio communications, live-fire operations, and mobile attack techniques. Regular training helps ensure firefighters are prepared to respond safely and effectively to vegetation fires and other rapidly changing incidents.

Events

Glenn County Fire Chiefs Association Dinner

On August 12, the Willows Fire Department hosted the monthly Glenn County Fire Chiefs Association dinner at the Willows Fire Station. The gathering provided an opportunity for fire service leaders from throughout Glenn County to connect, strengthen working relationships, and continue the regional coordination that is essential during mutual aid and large-scale emergency responses.

WFD Volunteers Sell Out at Farmers Market Fundraiser!

The community showed its support for Willows Fire Department volunteers during a tri-tip sandwich fundraiser at the Farmers Market on August 21. The fundraiser was a tremendous success, with volunteers selling out of sandwiches in less than an hour!

Thank you to Captain Chapman, the WFD volunteer team, and everyone who stopped by to support our local firefighters!





Strike Team Assignments

Major Wildfire Responses

Willows firefighters continued to provide assistance beyond the local area during the busy summer wildfire season. Engine 12 was assigned to the Timber Incident in Monterey County beginning August 17 and returned home September 1 after approximately two weeks on assignment.



Engine 5 was deployed to the Hawk Incident in the Reno, Nevada area on August 23 and returned August 29. These deployments allow WFD personnel to support communities facing significant emergencies while gaining valuable experience that can be brought back to benefit the Willows community.

Regional Prepositioning: Funded by Office of Emergency Services

On August 28, the Willows Fire Department participated in a 24-hour, OES-funded prepositioning assignment in response to heightened fire conditions. Fire engines from Willows, Orland, Kanawha, Elk Creek, and Hamilton City were upstaffed to provide additional regional response capacity. Artois provided an upstaffed water tender, while Orland also upstaffed its dozer.

Prepositioning places additional firefighting resources in service before an emergency occurs, allowing agencies to respond more quickly when weather and fire conditions create an increased risk of significant incidents. These assignments are funded by Cal OES.

Updates

Surplus Orland Police Department Equipment Acquired

On August 6, Fire Chief Nate Monck and the City Mechanic traveled to Orland to pick up surplus equipment from the former Orland Police Department as authorized by the Willows City Council. The equipment included three Crown Victoria police vehicles, tasers, light bars, siren controllers, long-gun locks, and other miscellaneous public safety equipment.

The acquisition provides the City with equipment and resources that may be evaluated for future public safety needs as Willows continues its efforts to reestablish the Willows Police Department.

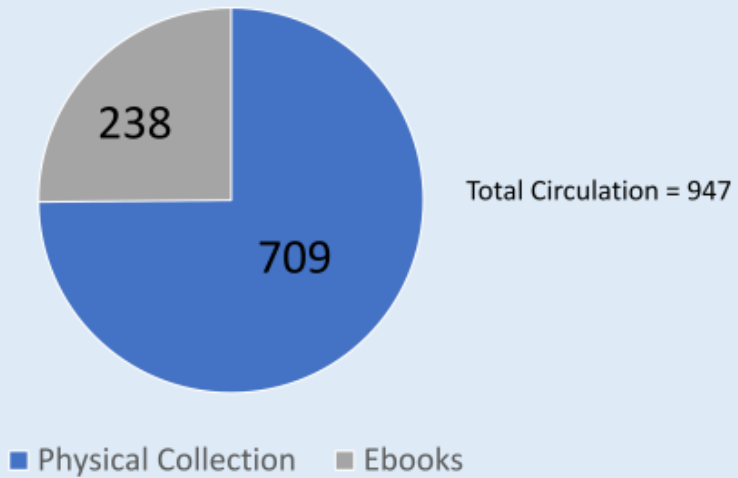
